### Personal statement advice

from those who made it!



#### Aaron Burrows is currently studying *BA Hons Theology, Religion and Ethics* at Winchester University

Make sure you explain what you enjoy about the subject – think about the subject content: are there any philosophical/theological/ethical questions you love exploring? Are there any scholars that fascinate you? Are there any religions you want to learn more about? Explain why and how the degree will accommodate your questions.
Ensure you express a desire to learn and try to make sure this is a degree you are really passionate about! Three years can seem like a long time ... it's even longer when you're not invested in your subject.

• Always state **why you want to study the subject in the first place** and what you hope to get out of your studies – so, think about what you find interesting about the subject; why you want to study the subject; what you want to do with the degree in the future.

• Extra-reading is always a positive – this type of degree always expects you to do A LOT of reading, by showing you've read around the subject outside of what is expected at A-level is definitely a good idea. If you have done any extra-reading ... let them know.



To stand out from others, perhaps talk about a film or fictional book you read and explain how it dealt with difficult philosophical questions. Almost all films and many books deal with matters of philosophy, ethics, theology, religion and so on. Show them that you can make these links – don't just limit your discussion to textbooks you've read in the classroom.
Make sure you read through your personal statement again and again ... and again.
Don't just read it in your head, read it out loud and get others to read through it. Check spelling, punctuation and grammar and be concise with what you are saying i.e. can what you've written in three sentences be condensed into one sentence?



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
