### **Top Tips!**




- Research Before Applying: Find out what the entry requirements are to avoid disappointment when applying. Look at required reading and any advice about what your chosen university are looking for in candidates.
- Don't Attend Just One Open Day : Keep your options open and attend a few different university open days to gain insight into which is the one for you.
- Watch films: It sounds obvious, but this is a good idea when applying for a film course.
  Find films that are known for their style, script or just general greatness and watch them with a critical eye. Think about the camera work, acting style, lighting and staging. These are all things you will be studying on your course.
- Speak to a Student: Researching your course is fundamental but so is talking to someone that has real experience of taking the course. Ask about the workload, how they found the teaching and what opportunities the course provided for career paths. You can't beat firsthand experience.
