Why Study Nursing?

1. Helping others

Nursing is an altruistic profession, concerned with aiding those who can not fend for themselves.

2. Nurses are well respected

Nursing is a noble profession; those who pursue it are well respected and valued members of society. People like people who help people.

3. Nursing students have great Graduate Prospects

As with many medical degrees, Nursing boasts a very high Graduate Prospects score, meaning that employment is probable come graduation. 94% of nursing graduates are in work 6 months after graduating. 4. Nursing is exciting

As careers go, Nursing is reasonably high-octane, and so a typical day at the office could be an adrenaline filled, challenging and vibrant affair. You are not confined to the UK either.

5. Nurses can work anywhere

Become a registered nurse and your skills will be in demand throughout the country. You may even want to take your work abroad, and with the right qualifications you can.

6. Applicable skills

Nursing will offer you training in complex medical care, of which some are not dependent on any tangible equipment. By studying Nursing, your potential ability to save a life can be extrapolated to everyday scenarios, making you an asset to your family and society as a whole

The first thing to decide is which field of nursing you want to study in, so use the links below to find more about them. In all of these fields you'll have the opportunity to make a real difference to the lives of people each and every day. The four fields of nursing are:

- <u>adult nursing</u>
- children's nursing
- <u>learning disability nursing</u>
- <u>mental health nursing</u>





You may also consider a career in an Allied Health Profession (AHP), which comprise 14 distinct occupations including: art therapists, dietitians, dramatherapists, music therapists, occupational therapists, operating department practitioners, orthoptists, osteopaths, paramedics, physiotherapists, podiatrists, prosthetists and orthotists, diagnostic and therapeutic radiographers, and speech and language therapists. An Academic Paragraph

One of the best things to talk about in a nursing application is your work experience or experience of care – BUT you need to think critically and analyse as well as list, to make it academic.

Having an academic paragraph in your personal statement is really important. You can us these reading lists and online courses to help analyse or as a work-experience substitute. Makes notes as you go to refer back to later.

Work Experience

It is important that students use their work experience as a means of checking that a caring job is right for them, so reflect on this before submitting an application. In addition, applicants have to demonstrate that they share the values and behaviours of the NHS Constitution. Work experience is the best way to provide evidence of these values for a UCAS application. NHS Trusts offer a limited number of placements in their local hospitals (search individual NHS Trust websites for these) – but they stress that this experience does not involve giving direct patient care. Remember that there are many settings where you can get general care experience or develop communication skills, all of which will be useful to you. Think about placements at:

- Nursing or residential homes
- Schools
- Mental health units
- Charities that help people with physical or learning disabilities
- Homeless shelters
- Hospices

Make notes as you do to refer back to later, and think about why the things you see and do are taking place

The 6 Cs are a set of values for all health and social care staff in the NHS.

They are:

- Care
- Compassion
- Competence
- Communication
- Courage
- Commitment

Can you link your experiences (both work experience and extracurricular) to the 6 Cs? This is a great way of not just showing what you have done, but what those experiences say about YOU.

Personal Advice from those who made it!



Hannah Lond, *Children Nursing* at Anglia Ruskin University "My advice would be don't panic! You will get where you need to be, even if it doesn't feel like it right now. Now is the perfect time to do some further research into courses and universities you're interested in.

See if you can speak to some current students at the universities on an app like UniBuddy in order to get more information about the universities and courses and what they have to offer.

You could also try doing some online courses to expand your knowledge in other areas, particularly if there are topics that your current studies don't cover, but you have a keen interest in. Any opportunity to boost your personal statement and CV is always worth doing.

However, don't worry too much. It's a weird time at the minute, don't put too much pressure on yourself to feel like you need to get everything done. Everyone is finding it challenging to achieve everything they want to achieve, so be realistic with yourself and do what you can! Achieving anything - no matter how little or small - will help you so much forward!
